VictimConnect Provides Confidential Referrals for Crime Victims



The VictimConnect Resource Center is a place for crime victims to learn about their rights and options confidentially and compassionately. VictimConnect is a completely anonymous weekday helpline offering information, referrals, and resources through toll free phone calls or texting (855-4-VICTIM) or via online chat. Whether by chat, text, or phone, trained specialists are available to assist victims of crime locate appropriate national, local, or online referrals. The VictimConnect Resource Center also has a special focus on populations, crimes, and topics that are generally underrepresented or underserved in victim services. Visitors to the hotline receive strength-based and trauma-informed services and referrals in over 200 languages. During these difficult times, the helpline remains open for victims. 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The Native Love Project and Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month



February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month (TDVAM), a national effort to raise awareness and protect teens from violence. How can you make a difference? By encouraging your school, community-based organizations, Tribal leaders, parents, and teens to join together to prevent teen dating violence – both at home and in our communities. Those of us in Native communities often hear jokes about “Indian loving” as waking up with a hickey and a black eye – that is not love, it is dating violence. To support the effort, Verizon partnered with the National Ingenious Women’s Resource Center (NIWRC) to address teen dating violence among Native youth. The Native Love project provides opportunities for our young people to discuss teen dating violence and related issues to reframe

what Native Love is...including ways to transform our thoughts and actions to restore how we love, honor, and treat one another. The goal is to inspire, empower, and mobilize Tribal youth to advocate against violence against Native women, youth, and children and create positive social change in our communities. U.S. Department of Justice Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation (CTAS) Fiscal Year 2021 Competitive Grant Announcement

CTAS combines many of the Department of Justice’s (DOJ’s) existing Tribal government-specific competitive solicitations into a single solicitation, requiring only one application from each Tribe or Tribal consortium. This approach reduces the number of applications required to access funds and provides federally recognized Tribes, Tribal consortia, and Tribal designees the opportunity to develop a comprehensive approach to public safety and victimization issues. Note: CTAS is not a program but a single solicitation under which tribes can apply to seven separate grant programs from four grant-making offices.



TRAINING AND EVENTS

National Institute of Corrections' (NIC) "Becoming Trauma Informed: An Essential Element for Justice Settings"

In this Community Services Division-sponsored webinar series, NIC's Maureen Buell facilitated a stimulating discussion featuring Stephanie Covington, PhD, of the Center for Gender and Justice, and Nena Messina, PhD of Envisioning Justice Solutions. All three speakers have extensive experience delivering trauma informed education and services to the men and women in the custody of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation as well as other state and local agencies nationally. The webinar series guides administrators and correctional staff through the process and provides updated information and research. This dynamic three-part webinar series focused on the following topics:

- 1) The Association between ACEs and Criminal Justice Involvement
- 2) Trauma Informed Treatment and Theory
- 3) Becoming Trauma Informed and Moving to Trauma Responsive.

Domestic Violence and Dispatch Webinar

According to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, on average, 20 people are physically abused by their intimate partner every minute. As a result, telecommunicators have a significant likelihood of receiving domestic violence related calls. These calls can often be volatile and present safety risks for the caller and responding officers. This session will focus on steps telecommunicators and dispatchers can take when handling calls related to domestic violence. Knowing the types of questions to ask, as well as some underlying motivations to these situations, can help telecommunicators keep callers and responders safe.

Join the free, 2-hour live SOAR to Health and Wellness training that teaches providers how to identify and respond to human trafficking. After completing the training, learners will be able to: describe the types of human trafficking and potential risk factors, identify individual and environmental indicators of trafficking, screen and identify individuals

who may have experienced trafficking, utilize a trauma-informed, person-centered, multidisciplinary approach, assess the unique needs of individuals who have experienced trafficking, deliver appropriate services to individuals who have experienced trafficking, and share the importance of trafficking awareness and responsiveness with others in their work environment.

The Transitional Housing Assistance Grants for Victims of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault and Stalking supports programs that provide 6-24 months of transitional housing with support services. This opportunity supports programs that provide transitional housing and support services specifically for victims who are homeless or in need of transitional housing because of a situation of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking; and whom emergency shelter services or other crisis intervention services are unavailable or insufficient.

TSASP supports efforts to create, maintain, and expand sustainable sexual assault services provided by Tribes, Tribal organizations, and nonprofit Tribal organizations within Indian country and Alaska Native villages. TSASP-supported projects provide intervention, advocacy, accompaniment (e.g., accompanying victims to court, medical facilities, or police departments), support services, and related assistance for adult, youth, and child victims of sexual assault, non-offending family and household members of victims, and those collaterally affected by the sexual assault.

The Grants to Enhance Culturally Specific Services for Victims of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking Program supports the maintenance and replication of existing successful community-based programs providing culturally specific services to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking, as well as the development of innovative culturally specific strategies to enhance access to services and resources for victims who face obstacles to using more traditional programs.

Bureau of Justice Assistance FY 2021 Tribal Civil and Criminal Legal Assistance Program

The solicitation seeks applications for civil legal assistance services and criminal legal assistance services. This program provides civil and criminal legal assistance to low-income individuals, Indian tribes, and Tribal justice systems to support the development and enhancement of Tribal justice systems and access to those systems. While the core focus of this program is to provide direct legal services, funding can also support other needs of eligible Tribes such as providing conflict counsel for Tribes exercising enhanced sentencing authority or special domestic violence criminal jurisdiction authorized through the Violence Against Women Act of 2013 and supporting veterans' legal clinics for Native American veterans.

OVW Fiscal Year 2021 Grants for Outreach and Services to Underserved Populations Solicitation

This program aims to develop and implement outreach strategies targeted at, and provide victim services to, adult or youth victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking in underserved populations. Survivors from underserved populations face challenges in accessing comprehensive and effective victim services that are accessible, culturally relevant, and responsive. As a result, survivors from underserved communities often do not receive appropriate services. The Underserved Program supports projects that address these gaps. Funds may be used to: develop or enhance population specific victim service, develop or enhance outreach strategies to reach underserved survivors, build the capacity of population specific organizations to serve survivors of these crimes, build the capacity of victim service providers to provide victim services that are population specific, train and educate community partners and the criminal justice system on the needs of survivors from underserved populations, and develop culturally and linguistically appropriate materials for underserved survivors.

OVW Fiscal Year 2021 Training and Services to End Violence Against Women with Disabilities Grant Program (DGP) Solicitation

The goal of DGP is to create sustainable change within and between organizations that improve the response to individuals with disabilities and Deaf individuals who are victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking, and to hold perpetrators of such crimes accountable. DGP funds establish and strengthen multidisciplinary collaborative relationships, increase organizational capacity to provide accessible, safe, and effective services to individuals with disabilities and Deaf individuals who are victims of violence and abuse, identify needs within the grantee's organization and/or service area, and develop a plan to address those identified needs that builds a strong foundation for future work.

OVW Fiscal Year 2021 Grants to Tribal Governments to Exercise Special Domestic Violence Criminal Jurisdiction Solicitation

Through this grant program, Indian Tribes receive support to exercise special domestic violence criminal jurisdiction (SDVCJ) and technical assistance (TA) for planning and implementing changes in their criminal justice systems necessary to exercise the jurisdiction. The program encourages collaborations among Tribal leadership, courts, prosecutors, attorneys, defense counsel, law enforcement, probation, victim service providers, and other partners to ensure that victims find safety and justice and that non-Indians who commit crimes of domestic violence, dating violence, and violations of protection orders in the Indian country of the participating Tribe are held accountable.
